



One of the concerning features of the pandemic is the ubiquitous discussion concerning the numbers of positive cases and deaths, and the prominence of public personalities who only speak of the spread of the virus. For many people, therefore, the only voice that is heard is the voice that promotes fear of the virus and offers a vaccine as the only source of hope. This is a harmful reductionism of life, especially for people who have effectively been confined to their homes and deprived of meaningful interaction with other human beings for a significant period of time.

This has to be a matter of concern for the Church. Many of its most faithful members do not have the reflex, much less the resources, to turn to the word of God. Consequently, these are unable to avail of the



power of God's word to transform fear into hope, to offer meaning in the face of suffering, and to offer spiritual nourishment when the Sacraments are not available. People of faith deserve more than just alarming daily numbers and the promise of a vaccine. They deserve to be able to hear the voice that promises salvation, that says, "do not fear ... I have called you by name, you are mine" (Is 43:1). Resources such as Magnificat are undoubtedly helpful in offering people the word of God daily with useful commentaries but the reach of such re-

sources is minimal. The problem lies in the simple fact that the majority of Catholics do not know that the word of God has the power to offer them hope and meaning, and despite the desire of Vatican II and subsequent synods to put the word of God more at the heart of the life of the Church, the pandemic has shown that we are a long way off realising that desire.
