World Mission Sunday is the Holy Father's annual appeal for spiritual and financial support so that the life-giving work of overseas mission and missionaries can continue. It always falls on the second last Sunday in October, and like the Good Friday collection for the Holy Land and Peter's Pence, it is one of three annual universal Church collections. World Mission Sunday collections take place in every single parish where the Church is present. This includes not only Ireland and Europe,

but also in poorer parishes in developing countries. It is a moment of universal solidarity when each member of the Church family, regardless of location or background, play their part in supporting each other. Pope Leo sends food and medicine to Gaza and Ukraine As humanitarian aid is finally granted access to the Gaza Strip, Pope Leo XIV instructs the Office of Papal Charities to send medicines for the youngest victims of the two-year conflict. Meanwhile, food aid distributions continue in Ukraine.



It is important for us to realize that the story of the Good Samaritan remains timely even today. "If I encounter a person sleeping outdoors on a cold night, I can view him or her as an annoyance, an idler, an obstacle in my path, a troubling sight, a problem for politicians to sort out, or even a piece of refuse cluttering a public space. Or I can respond with faith and charity, and see in this person a human being with a dignity identical to my own, a creature infinitely loved by the Father, an

image of God, a brother or sister redeemed by Jesus Christ. That is what it is to be a Christian!

Can holiness somehow be understood apart from this lively recognition of the dignity of each human being?" What did the Good Samaritan do? From "Dilexit Te," ('I have loved you'), a document Pope Francis was writing before he died, and has been completed by Pope Leo. It speaks about the Church's tradition of caring for the poor and how it is still our responsibility today, as Church and as individuals.





The 1700th anniversary of the Nicene Creed.

The Nicene Creed is a fundamental statement of Christian belief adopted at the First Council of Nicaea in 325 AD to define the nature of God, Jesus Christ, and the Holy Spirit. It was created to address and

refute Arianism, which claimed Jesus was a created being. The Creed affirms the Trinity - that the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit are one God - and is accepted as authoritative by major Christian denominations like Roman Catholic, Eastern Orthodox, and Anglican churches. It is a defining statement of faith that includes beliefs about God, Jesus's divinity and humanity, the Holy Spirit, the Church, and life after death . We say the Nicene Creed at Mass most Sundays.
